









PREAMBLE

The divine grace of Lord Krishna and the choicest blessings of His Holiness 108 Goswami Shree Mathureshwarji Maharajshree had inspired the communities of Gujarathis and Rajasthanis, settled in Chennai, to establish a charitable organization with the sole purpose of imparting quality education to all and the linguistic minority in particular. Accordingly, they founded Shri. Vallabhacharya Vidya Sabha in the year 1963. The natural order of charity of the chief donors, late Shri. Jamuna Doss Dwaraka Doss and late Shri Amichand Doss Dwaraka Doss, in generously donating a sprawling 19.2 acre spread in the city, integrated with the philanthropic contribution from the kind and large hearted Gujarathi and Rajasthani Vaishnav Communities (Agarwals and Maheswaris) saw the inception of this institution, Dwaraka Doss Goverdhan Doss Vaishnav College in 1964. Shri Vallabhacharya Vidya Sabha, the managing body of the college, later established three more educational institutions, namely Kola Perumal Chetty Vaishnav Senior Secondary School (1974), Kola Saraswathi Vaishnav Senior Secondary School (1977) and M.O.P. Vaishnav College for Women (1992).

Started in 1964, with a unique distinction of a first grade college, D.G.Vaishnav College expanded over the four decades in terms of infrastructure, which is upgraded, modernized and brought to the levels of state of art technology. In terms of number of courses offered, staff and students, the college had registered a horizontal and vertical growth across Arts, Science, Commerce, Computer Science, Information & Technology and Life Sciences. The college has grown into a full-fledged centre of learning and research. With periodic introduction of new courses, scientific teaching methods, innovative extra academic orientation, such as presentation, field trips, industrial visits, surveys, case studies and society related activities, learning is made meaningful and contemporary. The impeccable guidance and the strong support extended by the staff, teaching and non-teaching, in catering to the specific needs of the student community have helped the college earn a covetable place among the colleges in the city.



During the span of a little over 40 years, in its endeavor to impart value based quality education to the youth, D.G. Vaishnav College crossed many a milestone, creating outstanding academic records, won several accolades in co-curricular, NCC, NSS and community related activities. The college has produced over the years several university toppers, achievers in sports, recipients of national and state awards in NSS and NCC for distinguished contribution to the society. The encomiums and glories that the college has received from various quarters are primarily due to the grace of the presiding deity of the campus, Lord Krishna and the blessings of his Holiness 108 Shri. Mathureshwarji Maharajshree, complimented by the boundless efforts of the management and the extraordinary commitment of the teaching and non-teaching staff of the college. This has been truly reflected in the accreditation exercise carried out by the NAAC peer team which awarded **Grade A** for the institution.

Our college is a co-educational institution with strength of around 5700 students across 44 programmes. The exemplary behavior and involvement of the students in bringing credit in academics and in other spheres has been widely appreciated. The effort of the management in encouraging meritorious students by extending financial assistance needs special mention.


VISION

To impart value based quality academia; to empower students with wisdom and to charge them with rich Indian traditions and culture; to invoke the self, to broaden the same towards nation building, harmony and Universal brotherhood.

CURRICULAR ASPECTS

With the introduction of autonomy the institution revamped the curriculum and syllabi to achieve the vision and make education more contemporary and relevant. While designing and developing the curriculum, due consideration was given to the goals and objectives of the institution viz,

- Excellence in academics
- Scope for self-improvement
- Imparting values personal, social and moral
- Employability of the students enhanced through curricular and co-curricular activities



A Compulsory Computer Literacy Programme (Computing Skills) has been introduced as part of the curriculum for the PG students of all departments other than computer science.

Academic flexibility is ensured by providing options in elective subjects, supportive courses and allied subjects. Students undergoing Graduation in the institution can opt for another Diploma / Graduation in any other university simultaneously through distance learning method.

The curriculum and syllabi are reviewed periodically by the members of the Board of Studies. Revision of the syllabi is carried out whenever the need arises. While updating the curriculum the views of the stakeholders are considered through an effective feedback mechanism.

TEACHING-LEARNING AND EVALUATION

Admission process is made transparent by displaying the list of selected candidates according to the cut-off marks based on the norms of the Government of Tamil Nadu from time to time. Every year the institution publishes prospectus giving the details of various courses and admission procedures. The details are also made available in the institutional website.

Students are selected on the basis of merit, performance in the entrance examination and personal interview, on the basis of the cut-off marks, strictly adhering to the norms stipulated by the Government of TamilNadu from time to time. Details of the various courses offered and the admission procedure is clearly delineated in the prospectus. Priority is given to socially, economically-challenged, differently-able students and sports persons.

Periodical unit-wise tests and seminars are conducted for slow learners. They are provided with study materials. A record of the performance of the students in the



examinations are maintained by the respective teachers and suggestions for improvement given to the students.

An academic calendar is prepared every year containing the work plan for each semester with schedule for teaching, co-curricular, extra-curricular and examinations.

The teaching methodology is more learner-centric, as it includes assignments, seminars, group discussions, paper presentations and poster exhibits. The active participation of students in these activities makes learning effective and interesting.

Alongside the traditional chalk and talk method, LCD, OHP and computers have been provided for the use of the faculty. Internet facility provides easy and quick access to information which in turn has made teaching/learning a rich and rewarding experience. Five seminar halls equipped with computer, LCD projector, and audio/video DVD player, have been provided to ensure that active interaction takes place between the teacher and the taught.

Multiple copies of latest edition of books have been added to the library collection every year. Internet and *EBCSO Digital library* facilities are used by both students and faculty. Guest Lectures and Seminars are organized periodically to keep pace with recent developments.

The institution has competent and qualified staff members in all the faculties. Instead of depending only on terminal performance, emphasis is laid upon continuous performance during the semester. Flexibility in **CIA** pattern has been provided to make evaluation more innovative. Seminars, assignments, project works have been introduced as major parameters for evaluating the student performance.

After inception of autonomy (2009-2010), office of Controller of Examinations was established. The Office of the Controller of Examinations is fully computerised. Central evaluation system is followed for both UG and PG programmes. Double evaluation system is followed for both UG and PG programmes. The results are published in our institutional website within a month of the completion of examinations. The students can represent their grievances regarding examinations to the Controller of Examinations through the concerned Heads of the Departments.



RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

Having served in the field of Higher Education for almost four decades, the institution shifts its focus from conventional education to community oriented and research oriented education. Sophisticated and latest scientific instruments are available in all science departments.

Faculty members are encouraged to submit project proposals for external funding. Institution encourages the staff to pursue research in their area of interest. Laboratory facilities are provided to staff members who wish to take up research projects. Faculty members enjoy the freedom to guide research scholars of various universities and institutions.

Ph.D programme is offered in the departments of Economics, Commerce, Computer Science and Chemistry. M.Phil programme is offered in the Departments of Commerce, Economics, Chemistry and Mathematics. These programmes are affiliated to University of Madras, Chennai. In addition, some faculty members are recognized as research supervisors for M.Phil and Ph.D degree programmes of various universities.

PROJECTS UNDERTAKEN:

The institution has to its credit in the area of funded research projects.

- Three minor research projects approved by UGC were completed during 2004-2008.
- Presently, three ongoing minor research projects have been approved and funded by the UGC are being carried out.

PUBLICATIONS:

- Faculty members have published around fifty papers in international journals and forty six papers in national journals and Conferences in the past five years.
- Five of the staff members have publication with citation index.
- Twelve members of the staff of various departments have published 24 books.

CONSULTANCY:

Strategic plans are being developed to establish consultancy services.

The institution has a tie-up with CTS Chennai.



Both the faculty and students have benefitted from the guest lectures. The college has entered into an agreement with Sankara Nethrayala Chennai and the Department of Computer Science offers training program on basics of Computing Skills to the employees of **Sankara Nethrayala**, Chennai. So far, the department has trained **150** employees.

Institutional tie-up with **TCS**, **Chennai**, provides training on employability skills to the final year SC/ST students for about 80 hours. At the end of the training program, students are subjected to selection process and finally offer letters are issued to the selected candidates. With the help of the University of Madras the same sort of training and placement is extended to SC/ST graduates/post-graduates who has completed their degree from other colleges.

EXTENSION ACTIVITIES:

As academic excellence alone will not make a perfect citizen of a country, the institution extends its helping hand to send the students to various villages to carry out community services through extension programme to the socially and economically weaker sections. In addition to the extension programme, the institution has organized social clubs such as NSS, NCC, Retract Club, Blood Donors' Club, RRC, Project Green, Consumer Citizen Club, YRC and Purushothamdas Nethra Seva Sangh.

Under the autonomous system extension activities and community projects are integrated with curriculum and credits are offered for such participation. Teams of faculty through NSS act as program officers / coordinators for promoting and monitoring the extension activities of the institution and other service organizations.

The institution has adopted more than five villages during the last five years and has worked for the welfare of the local communities.

The institution encourages the departments to collaborate with other organizations to carry out research work.

The institution has also been recognized as an **Extension Centre** by various Universities and this type of collaboration provides opportunity for sharing of expertise and resources and helps students to undergo additional courses.

The institution collaborates with various NGOs like Rotary Club, Red Ribbon Club (RRC), to carry out community projects.



INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES:

Administrative Office (Principal's Office, College Office and CoE's Office), Staff Room for each department and sufficient number of classrooms are available. Placement Cell, Fine Arts Centre, NSS, NCC and ROTRACT Club have exclusive office rooms allotted for them.

Science departments are equipped with spacious laboratories. Audio-Visual Lab and Instrumentation laboratory for multi-disciplinary research (Biotechnology) are also available. Documentation Centre (Library) that provides printing and photocopying services, lounge, women's common room and ample parking space form part of the infrastructure. Lift services are available in MCA, MBA and Canteen blocks.

State-of-the-art conference hall, seminar halls, open-air auditorium, multipurpose indoor-auditorium with advanced public address system and gymnasium are available.

The college houses a hostel inside the campus. Solar power generating system is installed for providing hot water to the inmates of the hostel.

Drinking water (with RO) facility is provided in each block. The college has four independent electrical service lines for providing power supply. **3 KVA**, **30 KVA and 40 KVA** Generator facility is available. A separate block for Library has been constructed.

PLANNING AND EVALUATION COMMITTEE keeps track of the existing facilities of the institution and ensures optimal utilisation of the infrastructure.

The institution has appointed staff exclusively for maintenance work. Service engineers are appointed for the maintenance of computer and other network facilities in the institution. The college has signed an Annual Maintenance Contract (AMC) with a leading computer service provider. For optimum utilization of infrastructure, the institution conducts classes on a shift basis.

The library is fully computerized and is equipped with Modern Library Management Software. Both Open Access system and computer aided search facilities are available. Bar Coding System has been introduced. Internet, EBCSO and Reprography facilities are available in the library. A Library Advisory Committee has been constituted which monitors the regular activities of library and offer suggestions for improvement. Solar energy is most effectively made use of in the library for its lighting and other power needs.



Central Computing facility is available in the Department of Computer Science and Applications.

STUDENT SUPPORT

To plan effective teaching strategies class-wise screening tests are conducted before the commencement of the programme. A special screening test is conducted for assessing students' communication skills. These screening tests help categorize the students according to their knowledge level and plan the teaching methodology accordingly.

The academic performance and personal behavior of the students are monitored regularly by the respective teachers who guide and motivate students. Student-Parent-Teachers Meetings are conducted to convey the progress of the students to the parents at the department level.

PLACEMENT CELL:

The institution has an active placement cell with an officer who guides and assists career aspirants among the student community. The placement cell organizes both campus and off-campus interviews. The institution encourages students to appear for various competitive examinations and special coaching classes are conducted for them. Entrepreneurial Development Programmes are conducted to promote self-employment.

Students receive financial aid through central/state government scholarships. Also, the institution extends support by offering fee concessions. Every year endowment scholarships are given to meritorious students.

Counseling and career guidance committee assists students and helps them make wise decisions. Women's students forum has its counselors who address their problems and help them resolve issues. Special attention is given to differently-abled students and their specific needs are met with.

ALUMNI ASSOCIATION:

The institution has a well established Alumni Association which organizes periodical gatherings and get-togethers to share useful information. The alumni offer suggestions to equip the curriculum to keep in pace with the recent trends.

The institution has a **Grievance Redressal Cell** to deal with the students' grievances. For girl students there is a separate Women Grievance Redressal Cell which helps address issues related to sexual harassment of girl students.



A part-time Medical Officer and two full-time Nursing Assistants are available. The institution has health insurance scheme for the welfare of students and also for the staff members.

The institution has a dynamic **Fine Arts Centre**, Srinath Fine Arts Academy, which organizes cultural shows, music festivals and competitions on various themes to enhance the talents of the students.

The **College Magazine** and the **in-house Newsletters** published by a few departments help identify and showcase the students communicative abilities, creative writing skills and logical reasoning.

Sports and Games have become a priority issue and the Department of Physical Education has brought laurels to the institution by participation at the National and international level. The outstanding sports persons are given scholarships and fee concessions.

GOVERNANCE AND LEADERSHIP:

The Institution is run by Shri. Vallabacharya Vidhya Sabha.

The College has its own governing body with Shri. Krishnadas Purushotham Das as the Chairman. The other members are constituted as per the norms of the UGC and the University, with representatives from the University of Madras, the Government of Tamil Nadu and from the educational field.

The College has established a number of Committees and Statutory Academic Bodies (like Board of Studies, Academic Council) which periodically meet to help in decision making processes. Due representation is given to various stakeholders of the institution for making the functioning transparent.

The activities of the institution is coordinated and monitored by the heads of the departments under the supervision of the head of the institution.

In order to offer quality and value based education, the management has appointed dedicated, qualified and competent teaching staff as per the required work load and they are paid as per the norms of UGC. The expertise of the faculty is optimally used by providing inter-disciplinary courses.

Staff development programmes are conducted periodically on topics such as Research Projects, Internal Quality Assurance and Value Education.



The Finance Committee of the institution plans the budget and monitors its effective and optimal utilization. Internal and external audit of the accounts are done regularly. Departments are motivated to raise funds from external agencies.

INNOVATIVE PRACTICES

The institution has established Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC), to ensure quality sustenance. IQAC of the institution organizes periodic meetings and seminars to develop quality enhancement and quality sustenance strategies. A team of members from IQAC inspects the departments periodically. Feedbacks on teachers and course evaluation are conducted regularly by the IQAC.

Innovations in curriculum are promoted by the introduction of interdisciplinary courses and vocational courses. Curriculum Development Committee (BOS) plays a vital role in this regard.

The departments are permitted to design their own mechanism of teaching, learning and evaluation. Departments and teachers who introduce innovative practices are encouraged and appreciated. Apart from regular core and elective subjects, Skill Based courses, Value Education are offered as compulsory subjects.

Women Redressal Cell of the institution regularly organizes programmes for gender sensitization and related issues. Maintaining gender balance is not an issue in the institution as the institution operates under co-educational system in Shift-I and Shift-II. Around 53 per cent of the staff members are women and due representation is given to women staff in various committees.

Alumni Meetings are conducted periodically to involve all its stakeholders in planning the academic programmes. Feedbacks are also obtained from the stakeholders to evaluate the academic programmes and their views and concerns are taken seriously. Due representation is given to the alumni in Academic Council and IQAC.

Staff members maintain a cordial relationship with the students and take personal interest in alleviating the problems of the students belonging to the economically weaker sections. Counseling Centre, Grievance Cell and Alumni Association established in the institution help in maintaining good rapport with stakeholders.

The curriculum of the institution is planned in such a way to provide opportunities for Human Resource Development in every discipline. To be on par with international standards, the curriculum and assessment patterns are updated whenever necessary.



In the quest for excellence, syllabus is constantly updated for the existing courses and is strengthened to make the institution unique. Students are encouraged to organize programmes such as seminars, conferences and workshops. This is primarily done to make them understand and learn nuances of leadership and management facets.

Community oriented projects are taken up by the institution in order to expose the students to real life situations and make them responsible citizens of the country.



Training programmes (finishing school) are organized to develop competency in communication skills, interpersonal skills and the like. Industry-academia collaboration serves twin purpose as it not only specifies the industry requirements but also ensures on campus recruitment. The various clubs and committees in the college give students an opportunity to develop their leadership and organizational abilities.

The Office of the Controller of Examinations is fully computerised. Latest software are used for preparing nominal roll, hall tickets, seating arrangement and attendance, invigilation duty, consolidating CIA and semester examination marks, preparing results and sorting out subject-wise results.



The papers are shifted immediately after the examination to a separate room in the COE wing, which is sealed every day after the office hours. To maintain the confidentiality, answer scripts are allotted dummy numbers and the evaluators are appointed directly by the COE.

2.6. BEST PRACTICES IN TEACHING, LEARNING AND EVALUATION

2.6.1. ADMISSION PROCESS AND STUDENTS'S PROFILE

The institution publishes the annual prospectus besides having an active website and advertises in regional and national dailies. Students are selected for admission on the basis of merit. The Government quota is followed in the selection of students. Students profile is maintained in each department as well as in the college office.

CATERING TO DIVERSE NEEDS

Teachers conduct screening test for assessing the students' knowledge, needs and skills before the commencement of the programme.

Special coaching classes are conducted for students from under-privileged backgrounds. A counselor is available in the Guidance and Counseling Cell to provide academic and personal guidance to the students when and where required. Special attention is given to differently-abled students and their specific needs are met on case by case basis.

TEACHING LEARNING PROCESS

The traditional class room method of chalk and talk is being minimized. Instead the staff and students are encouraged to make use of the ICT facilities. Teaching plans are prepared and followed by the teachers.

Slip tests and model examinations are conducted to improve the performance of students. Advanced learners are encouraged to excel by presenting papers in departmental seminars.

The library is equipped with broadband internet and EBSCO facilities.

TEACHER QUALITY

The college has sufficient number of qualified and competent teachers to handle all the courses. Teachers are encouraged to attend/organise national and



international conferences and seminars. Teachers are permitted to attend orientation and refresher programmes. All the faculty members are given sufficient training in ICT.

EVALUATION PROCESS AND REFORMS

Teacher's evaluation is done by students and academic peers. Performance appraisal of staff members is obtained periodically. Instead of depending only on terminal performance, emphasis is laid upon continuous performance during the semester. Seminars, assignments and project works are introduced as major parameters for evaluating the student performance.

CRITERION III RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION



3.1. PROMOTION OF RESEARCH

3.1.1. Describe various steps taken to encourage research by the faculty (by providing seed money, grants, and other facilities).

Departments have been asked to take up at least one research project. The institution provides laboratory facilities for researchers. Student projects are also encouraged even if it is not included in the curriculum. The proposal, (Flora Vaishnava), put forward by the Department of Botany was sanctioned.

3.1.2. Is research a significant activity of the College? How does the institution promote faculty participation in research and recognize faculty for guiding research?

Yes, research is a significant activity of the college. Faculty members are encouraged to submit project proposals to the Research Committee which scrutinises them and grants permission. The governing body of the college, allocates funds for taking up research projects for both staff and students.

3.1.3. What provision is made in the budget for research and development?

For Scientific Research, expenses for chemicals, equipment and other supplies are met along with regular budget of the department. Expenses for the other projects are claimed from the office. Rs 2,00,0000 has been sanctioned for the research programmers. UGC sponsored amount of Rs. 30,000 has been utilised for the promotion of research.

3.1.4. Does the College promote participation of the students in research through the academic programme?

Yes, The College is a recognised center for conducting research leading to M.Phil and Ph.D of University of Madras, Chennai in the disciplines of Commerce, Economics, Chemistry and Computer Science. The department of Mathematics offers M.Phil program. Few faculty in the departments of Hindi, English and Maths are recognised supervisors of M.Phil and Ph.D programmes of the University of Madras. Besides, a large number of faculty are recognised guides of other leading universities in Tamil Nadu such as Bharathiyar, Manonmaniyam Sundaranar and Mother Teresa Women's



University. About 35 students are presently pursuing their regular M.Phil programme and about 60 are doing their doctoral research.

3.1.5. What are the major research facilities developed and made available on the campus?

EBSCO facility is available in the library. FOS (Free Open Software) is installed in the Computer and Applications department. Scientific instruments such as spectrophotometers, colorimeters, pH meters, digital potentiometers, digital conductometers, gas chromatography etc., are available for analysis and characterization purposes. Further, all science departments are fully equipped with state of art technology. Also, internet connection is made available in all departments to access web resources and open access journals.

3.1.6. Does the college subscribe to research journals for reference as per the departmental requirements?

Yes, the college subscribes to research journals for reference as per the departmental requirements.

Subject experts from other academic institutions and industry representatives form part of the board of studies. They offer valuable inputs in designing and modifying courses. Sincere efforts are being made to collaborate with leading research institutes.

To facilitate and monitor research, the college has constituted a dedicated Research Committee comprising of research supervisors, heads of the departments concerned and subject experts approved by the university are formed as per the stipulations of the University from time to time.

The college also has power backup that can provide lighting in all classrooms during power cuts.

4.2.2. How the budget is optimally allocated and utilized?

Each department in the self-financing stream prepares the annual budget for infrastructure, academic activities and extension activities. The same is placed before the managing committee and the approval is accorded on a case to case basis. For government aided courses, the management sanctions the amount upon receiving requests from the departments.

4.2.3. Are there staff appointed for maintenance and repair? If not, how are the infrastructure facilities, services and equipment maintained?

Yes, There are separate staff members for maintenance and repair. There is a campus manager for maintenance who supervises maintenance of cleanliness of the campus and repair works. A plumber and an electrician are available to attend to repairs instantly. In addition to this, sweepers are outsourced to clean the restrooms and the campus. The team of security staff ensures the safety of the students.

4.2.4. How is the infrastructure optimally used?

Many courses are conducted in two shifts and the class rooms and labs are optimally utilized. During the weekends and vacations through formal collaboration with Universities in Tamil Nadu and IGNOU at national level, various programmes are conducted.





The college has entered into Annual Maintenance Contracts(AMC) to maintain computers and other equipment in good condition and to attend to repairs immediately.

The library has open access and the card system is used for security purpose.

Four seminar halls with LCD projector for power point presentation, virtual class room, NPTEL, NMEICT, and broad band internet connection facilities are available for the utilization of faculty members to prepare computer aided teaching and learning materials. Computer aided packages are helpful in question paper setting, magazine preparation, preparation of study materials and to maintain data about the attendance, result and progress of the students, preparation of time table, time schedule for various programmes, planning of lab sessions, updating stock position and preparing consolidation statements of requirements etc.,

Broad band facility is available in the library, office and the departments. It can be accessed by the students and faculty members.

Institutional website is available for providing information about the activities of the college, details of courses offered, about departments and faculty. It also gives information about admission procedures, end semester results and the photo gallery depicts the pictures of various important events.


Two air- conditioned conference halls, two air- conditioned seminar halls, and staff rooms for each department, lounge, auditorium, car parking, cycle parking and bike parking and rest rooms are part of the college infrastructure.

Communication facilities like telephone, STD, ISD, broad band, fax and photocopying are available in the campus.

The college is well connected by public transport system. Many students and staff members commute by public transport. A section of the staff and students also have their own vehicles. Water supply is provided by the municipality and the same water is treated by Reverse Osmosis System. Power supply is provided by the electricity board and the management also has a generator of **3 KVA**, **30 KVA** and **40 KVA**.



All the buildings within the campus are well connected with black metal top roads. Landscaping has been done to provide an ambience of lush greenery and serenity. The campus is home to gardens, lawns, nurseries, coconut grooves and greenhouses which create a pleasant environment.

ICT: Online tutorials are conducted with the help of the broadband connection.

5.1. STUDENT PROGRESSION

5.1.1. How does the institution monitor student progression?

A continuous assessment of the student's progression in academics is monitored by conducting periodical tests and examinations and their regularity to the college. Every department monitors the performance of the students not only in academics but also in extension activities such as participation in leadership programs, environmental related activities and community projects.

The student strength for this academic year 2010-2011 is 1979 (Day college). Out of 1979 students, 1490 are male students and 489 are female students. Most of the students are coming from the same state in which the college is situated.

5.1.4. What percentage of the students on an average progress to further studies?

On an average, nearly 50-60 % of the passed out UG students take up Post Graduate Education. Among the PG students about 10 % pursue research.

The dropout rate is very minimal after admission. It is on an average between 3 % and 4% for UG and from 1% to 2% for PG courses.

Through our placement cell, **585** students have been placed in leading companies last year. The placement cell has arranged 10 campus interviews in the past year to help students get good placements.

Experts from various industries like banking, IT, logistics, hospitality and audit and accounting were invited to enlighten students about the career opportunities. Students were given training in soft skills including training to attend group discussion and interview. Leading companies are given a platform every year to make presentations about their profiles and conduct campus interviews.

Every year our college prospectus is updated and it contains sufficient information about the courses, eligibility and the infrastructure facilities. Our handbook has the chronicle of events i.e. extra -curricular, co-curricular and curricular activities planned during each academic year.

Yes, The cell conducts many programmes like seminars, communication skills, skill development programmes, guest lectures for the students to perform well in the campus interviews. Few students opt for self employment. A few post graduate Computer Science students have started companies providing IT enabled services.


Leadership functions of the Head of the Institution.



1. Faculty profile, adequacy and competency of faculty.


- Many of the faculties of the Department of Physics are doctorates with the exception of a few who are currently pursuing doctoral programmes.

- ➤ Many of them are members of Board of Studies, Board of Examiners of various Universities and Autonomous Colleges.
- They are invited as resource persons to various educational institutions.
- ➤ The faculties have been regularly updating their knowledge by attending refresher courses and workshops.
- ➤ To popularize science among students and general public, the staff also publish articles in popular science topics in magazines.

2. Student profile according to programs of study, gender, region, etc.,

- ➤ In B.Sc. Physics (Day), we have 98 men students and 27 women students.
- ➤ B.Sc. Physics (Evening) has 22 men and 5 women students.
- The post graduate students of our department are 47 in number. Out of them, 31 are male and 16 are women. 40% of the students are from Chennai, 50% from rural areas like Gummudipoondi, Cheyyar, Thiruthani, Dharmapuri, Thiruvannamalai and Vellore. 10% are from other states like Nagaland, Kerala and Andra Pradesh.

DEPARTMENT OF BIOCHEMISTRY

1. Faculty profile, adequacy and competency of faculty.

The Department of Biochemistry consists of nine faculty members. Six members have passed the national eligibility test. Eight faculties have completed their M.Phil degree, three faculties have completed the M.Sc (BI) course while two are currently pursuing doctoral research.

2. Student profile according to programmes of study, gender, region etc.,

The department consists of around sixty male students and fifty three female students. There are seventy five students in B.Sc., Degree and thirty eight students in M.Sc., Degree course.

3. Changes made in the courses or programmes during the past five years and the contribution of the faculty to those changes.

A few changes have been made in the allied paper. Allied Subjects have been changed from Zoology to Microbiology. The department offered UG and PG Courses following the syllabus offered by the University of Madras. After the college became autonomous, the department revamped the syllabus and the same was implemented with the approval of the Board of Studies and the Academic Council.

4. Trend in the success rate and drop out rate of students during the last five years.

During the last five years, there has been an increase in the pass percentage. There has been a 100 percentage pass in three papers.

5. Enhancement of the learning resources during the past five years.

The department has one OHP, one LCD projector, 8 computers with bioinformatics software, free e-books, CD versions of international books are also available apart from the standard reference textbooks. The department has internet facility for accessing open access, e-journals which helps the post graduate students to work on their projects. The students are also encouraged to take up training programmes for one month during the summer vacation related to their application oriented subject. Students are also encouraged to visit foreign countries to do their summer internship.

DEPARTMENT OF BIO-TECHNOLOGY

1. Faculty profile, adequacy and competency of faculty.

The department of Bio-Technology includes ten faculty members. Dr. P. Muthupriya and Dr. E.Sumathi have Completed Ph.D. and Ms. G.K Thilaka, Ms. S.Meenakshi kannan, Ms. P. Vijaya, Ms. P. Indumathi, and Ms. R. sumathi, are pursuing their Ph. D. and Ms. S.P.Chamundeeswari, Ms. T. Yuvarani, and Ms. S.Kavitha, completed M.Phil degree.

2. Student profile according to programmes of study, gender, region etc.,

The Department of Biotechnology is part of the evening college (unaided Stream). The total number of students during the years 2005-2011, was 138 in P.G and 100 in U.G. In P.G, 37 males and 101 female's students were admitted. In U.G, 55 males and 45 female students were admitted.

Between the years 2006 –2009, the Department of Bio-Technology was non autonomous, following the CBCS pattern of the University of Madras. During this period, two of our faculty, were members of the Board of Studies, University of Madras. In the year 2009, the Department of Bio-technology came under the autonomous pattern. The UG and PG syllabi were modified according to the changing trends in the field and the common papers like NME, EVS, Soft Skills, Tamil (for non-native speakers of Tamil students) have been included as per University stipulations.

STEPS TAKEN TO ADDRESS THE ISSUES AND SUGGESTIONS OF THE PREVIOUS NAAC REPORT OF THE PEER TEAM (DECEMBAR 2004)

I. Issues that need to be given attention as observed by peer team:

1. The faculty may be encouraged to undertake research and socially relevant project

- Management encourages research by allotting funds to carry out research.
- ➤ Fee concession upto 50 % is provided to encourage faculty for pursuing research.
- ➤ 69 PhD's have been produced from May 2005 to Nov. 2011.
- Faculty are encouraged to pursue M.Phil., Ph.D. under FDP
- ➤ Department of Plant Biology and Plant Bio-Technology have taken In campus project on tree census totally funded by management.
- ➤ Many socially relevant projects were undertaken by our students through various wings such as NCC,NSS, Rortract ,Citizen Consumer Club, Red Ribbon Club and Enviro Club (Evaluation report II volume 1 pages 86 to 90 5.3).
- ➤ To make a specific mention, NCC expedition is conducted annually on is socially relevant projects on health related issues, organ donation, female infanticide, etc,.
- ➤ The annual blood donation camp conducted by NSS Units of the college post record collection of units of blood more than 1000.
- ➤ The department of social work in association with NGO undertakes a number of socially relevant projects every year. For details refer Annexure E.

2. Faculty Development Programme

Faculty (as detailed below) who have sought permission to pursue Ph.D. under FDP where accorded sanction.

- ➤ Ms. D Uthara, Lecturer, Department of Physics 2005 to 2007.
- ➤ Ms. K. Premalatha, Lecturer SS, Department of Chemistry 2009 to 2011.
- ➤ Ms.K.Prabha Rajagopalan, lecturer Department of Corporate Secretaryship 2010 to 2012

3. Consultancy culture needs to be inculcated in the college

Bio-Chemistry department in association with Swami Vivekananda Diagnostic Center managed by Lion's club offers consultation and expertise in clinical testing of blood samples, etc,

Department of Computer Applications conducted a Trainning program on Ms-Office Package and Internet for the staff of Sankara Nethralaya, Chennai

Department of Micro-biology offered consultancy as detailed bellow:

Dr.P.Vidya Head of the Department - Honoray Consultant for the effluent treatment at Amaravathy chemicals and fertilizers limited, Hyderabad.2007-2010.

Dr.S.Vijyalakshmi- Air quality consultant at Chennai Microprints Private limited, Chennai and Tall boy stationeries Private limited, Chennai.2008-2010.

Revenue generation has not been attempted as the services are offered free of cost.

4. Budgetary provision for minor research projects

In the recent Governing body meeting, decision has been taken to earmark funds upto Rs.2 Lakhs to be given as incentive for carrying out research work. This is apart from financial assistance from funding agencies such as UGC, DST. Etc,

5. Faculty may be provided seed money to attend conferences and workshops

- ➤ Management encourages research by transferring surplus funds for the promotion of research every year
- > 50% travel allowance is provided for teachers presenting papers in international conference
- Registration fee and expenses incurred by faculty in preparing charts for paper presentation at various conferences are reimbursed by the college management

6. The departments and faculty may take extra efforts to secure funding from various central funding agencies by submitting research projects

- ➤ To achieve this objective, UGC Coordination cell has been constituted, and seminars are organized to create awareness.
- ➤ UGC Coordination cell periodically informs about the various funding schemes of UGC and other external agencies for carrying out minor/major research projects to the faculty members.

> The management encourages and motivates faculty to apply for projects to various central funding agencies

Three minor projects had been sanctioned by UGC

- Dr. S. Narasimhan, Principal, Department of Economics: "Empowerment of women through social frame work – An assessment of self help group in the context of micro finance".
- 2. Dr. T. Santhanam, Head, Department of Computer Science: "Performance analysis of neural networks for classification of noises in images".
- 3. Dr. D Uthara, Head, Department of Physics: "To develop a model to calculate the carbon foot print of D G Vaishnav College".

7. A proper grievance redressal cell may be established

- ➤ Grievance redressal cell has been established with senior faculty as members (Deans)
- ➤ A separate women grievance redressal cell has been formed with experienced women faculty as members.
- ➤ A senior faculty member is designated as co-ordinator in-charge of discipline who also attends to the needs of students

II. Suggestions made by the peer committee of the previous NAAC committee

- 1. The college, with the available infrastructure and faculty may start skill based certificate and diploma programmes for the benefit of the students.
 - Workshops, gust lectures, mock sessions, role play and discussions are being organised by the department of English periodically, as part of the soft skill program
 - ➤ The placement cell has conducted two certificate programs namely 1. Tally 2. Financial Planning to our students.
 - ➤ The department of Micro-biology has conducted one certificate program in Food Technology.
 - ➤ The Emerald Earth (Enviro Club) in association with EXNORA sensitised the students with Vermicompost procedures.
 - ➤ The department of visual communication conducted workshop on Personality Development (2008) and Clay Model (2009) for its students.
 - ➤ The department of Bio-chemistry has organised a workshop to impart hands on training to students in basic computational Biology (2010)...
 - ➤ Most of the departments are planning to offer certificate courses and workshop during this academic year 2011-2012
- 2. For fast and speedy communication, college authorities may think of providing LAN and WAN on the college campus for inter connecting all the departments, library and main building.
 - Most of the departments are connected by LAN.
 - All the departments are provided with internet facility.
 - Few departments (working with stand alone systems) will be connected by LAN, shortly.
- 3. ODL system has become an integral part of higher education. The college in addition to IGNOU courses may explore possibilities of opening study control of state open university.

The department of Chemistry and Physics are conducting contact programme classes for the PG students (Institute of Distance Education) of University of Madras,

Chennai and Madurai Kamaraj University, Madurai. (Evaluative Report II volume 1 page 16-1.1.9)

4. A few more add on value modules may be made available to the student to supplement their qualifications.

- ➤ Beginning school programme is conducted for freshers as soon as they enroll themselves in the college to develop a positive outlook towards education and learning-School to College.
- ➤ Finishing school programme is conducted for final year UG students to equip them with the required skill sets for facing interviews and procure placements.College to Career.
- ➤ Soft skills program is made compulsory for UG students in order to improve their communication skills and leadership qualities. The course content has been revised to include more components of language learning.
- Leadership improvement programmes are periodically conducted for students under the patronage of NSS, NCC, Rotract to motivate and develop their skills.
- > Computer literacy programme is conducted for all PG (non-computer science) students to develop their basic computing skills.
- ➤ A social training program is conducted exclusively for SC/ST students and a few get selected and placed in leading IT companies.
- 5. Effective and optimum use of infrastructure in some of the departments like biotechnology, biochemistry, microbiology, computer science, visual communication, management and the sports facilities, open air theatre and centrally air conditioned auditorium may be carried out.
 - The students gain hands on experience by making optimum use of the latest instruments and equipments in the laboratories
 - ➤ The play grounds available are utilized to maximum extent, school students are allowed to have summer camps in our play grounds.
 - The college campus is used by the public for their morning walks.
 - ➤ The open air theatre and the air conditioned auditoriums are utilized to maximum extent by all departments to host intercollegiate functions and other socially relevant functions of different departments.

They are also rented out to other associations on special request subject to the availability of the auditorium, at nominal charges.

6. The college may think of involving the students and the faculty in the clean and green programme of the college.

The idea of keeping the Campus green through a project called "Project Green" was conceived in 2008. Students and faculty are involved extensively in maintaining campus green. Project Harivanam has been initiated in the campus in 2009. Mass tree plantation was carried out in the campus in 2010. The huge pond inside the campus is well maintained and used to store rain water. The same water is utilized after subjecting it to RO process for drinking purpose. Enviro club of the students called "Emerald Earth" was launched in the year 2010 in order to involve students in environment related activities.

7. The college may start Earn and Learn scheme (work scholarships) to needy students.

Under privileged students are given an opportunity to earn by working in the laboratory as lab assistants during holidays, when practicals for correspondence courses are conducted in the science laboratories.

The M.Sc., Mathematics students are given free accommodation in the hostel and they are allowed to work part-time in the library after college hours, for which they are given remuneration.

The MBA students are given scholarship and are asked to maintain database related to departmental library, issue and return of books, etc.
