
18. RENDEZVOUS 2020 — Virtual Alumni Meet:


20. LITEROSODY2020:




1.UNFINISHED: A MEMOIR


2.THE LITTLE BOOK OF ENCOURAGEMENT


3. AZADI

I surmise that even Wordsworth wandered like me,


To discover words to write.


RIDE A BICYCLE



FUTURE INDIA



Karl Marx



Karl Heinrich Marx(1818-1883), a political thinker, a Social Philosopher and a visionary who envisaged a world without divisions and exploitation. His clarion call to the working class and marginalized groups still hold relevance in today's world,

"Workers of the World Unite,

you have nothing to lose but your chains, you have a World to win"

The main focus of his ideology was the class struggles that created inequality in the society. He said "The History of hitherto all existing society is full of struggle between the haves and have-nots". In every society there are two classes—owners —working class, land lords—labourers, capitalists— workers, bourgeoisie-proletariats (class in the form of economic status and in some cases cultural).

The city has no place for the people who had actually built our houses, brick by brick.



There as on for the class struggle is private ownership and accumulation of surplus wealth and mainly, exploitation of the labour by the capitalists. There is a saying that- "refined sugar from the packing cannot be touched by a sugarcane farmer as his/her hand is dirty". Likewise, a daily wage construction worker cannot afford a building for a home himself. We are awestruck by the magnificent constructions and the crystal white sugar but fail to respect and acknowledge the contribution of the sugarcane farmer who cultivated it and the construction worker who built it. In this context, the ideas of Marx are very pertinent to end discrimination and exploitation of the labour force and create an equal world.




