A Candid Conversation with Mr. Karthikeyan, Political Editor, Puthiya Thalaimurai

How do you think journalism has evolved over the years, especially with the rise of Digital Media?

Print media laid journalism's foundation, while visual media added authenticity through real-time broadcasts. Digital media expanded access but introduced challenges like misinformation. Journalists must prioritize accuracy to uphold integrity in today's fast-paced

> What inspired you to take up this profession, and what would be the most challenging aspects of this profession?

I entered journalism accidentally. While preparing for a government job in Chennai, a friend noticed my Tamil pronunciation and suggested news reading. Parttime work in the field revealed how my skills applied here. Now,

I share ideas through my work. The biggest challenge is balancing speed and accuracy in the digital age.

With the rise of misinformation and fake news trends, how can media houses maintain credibility?

Misinformation spreads rapidly. Citizens must verify news before sharing, considering its impact. Media hous $es\,should\,fact\text{-}check\,rigorously\,and\,promote\,responsible\\$ reporting. Trust is built on accuracy, not speed.

What is the role played by social media in shaping modern journalism? Social media is unavoidable. While it amplifies positive news, its misuse can spread misinformation. Citizens shar-

ing news act as journalists, so they must ensure accuracy and social good, not personal gain. Responsibility lies with each user.

How can a journalist balance his/her journalistic integrity with the pressures of corporate or political influences?

My ethic is simple: never judge a story by caste, religion, or status. Stand with the affected. News involves victims and assailants, and we must side with the truth. Recognizing biases clarifies ethical dilemmas.

How can traditional media adapt to the fast-paced nature of digital news consumption?

Traditional media offers depth and reliability, especially during elections or crises. Independent journalists, with fewer resources, focus on niche stories. Viewers must choose credible sources, valuing quality over speed.

What are the key challenges in Tamil Nadu's media industry compared to the National Media? Tamil Nadu's politically aware audience strengthens

its media. However, information overload can be confusing. Hence, accurate filtering is vital.. Despite this, Tamil media thrives due to strong public engagement and management.

What are the emerging trends in news reporting that young journalists should prepare for? Explore diverse experiences, build confidence, and adapt. Clear communication, multi-dimensional thinking, and an engaging personality are crucial. The $\,$ future demands master storytelling across platforms.

How does an MA in Journalism & Communication prepare students to meet industry demands?

Insights on Stock Market Trends and Investment Strategies

What are the key trends shaping the stock market right now? Months after bearish trends influenced by U.S. tariff uncertainty and foreign institutional investors' (FIIs) sell-offs. the Niftv50 and BSE Sensex have recovered, aided by reduced FII selling. This has strengthened the Indian currency. Despite \$25 billion in net sales since September 2024, FIIs have recently turned net buyers, supporting the rally. However, volatility persists due to ongoing trade tensions and U.S. tariff

Which are the sectors that are currently performing well and why? Amid global economic uncertainty, it's difficult to rely on any one sector. However, the financial services sector showed signs of resilience and recovery in March2025, helping the Nifty50 regain some of its earlier losses. This rebound has helped restore investor confidence heading into the new fiscal year (FY26). With the Reserve Bank of India possibly cutting interest rates, rising credit growth, improving asset quality, and returning foreign inflows, the finance sector may continue to draw investor attention in the months ahead, becoming a more stable bet.

What are the common mistakes made by the new investors and how can they avoid them? Two frequent missteps among new investors include taking high risks without understanding market dynamics and panic-selling during downturns. Many beginners invest without assessing broader economic trends or company fundamentals, focusing instead on hearsay or short-term hype. In volatile markets, panic-selling can deepen losses and delay recovery. To avoid these pitfalls, investors should educate themselves, stay updated, diversify their portfolios, and avoid emotional decisions, focusing on long-term financial goals rather than short-term market noise.

How are Al and algorithmic trading changing the stock market landscape? AI-driven trading

tools can analyze massive datasets and detect market signals faster than humans. offering a competitive edge in speed and precision. However, Allacks the nuanced judgment and emotional intelligence that experienced investors bring. It may overlook qualitative factors like leadership changes or geopolitical context. AI is best used as a support tool, ideal for analysis and trend identification but not for completely autonomous investing decisions.

How do you assess the financial health of a company before investing in its stock? It's crucial to track a company's quarterly and annual reports when investing. Alongside assessing its financial health, understanding its competitors and sector position is key. Brokerage notes provide useful performance breakdowns and predictions. Additionally, monitoring trading volume is important, as higher volume with rising prices signals strength, while falling prices with rising volume indicate downward pressure.

IMPORTANCE OF EXAM STRESS AND ANXIETY MANAGEMENT

How does exam stress affect physical and mental health?

Exam stress can have a profound impact on both physical and mental health. Physically, it may lead to disrupted sleep patterns, chronic fatigue, and difficulty concentrating, all of which reduce cognitive performance. It can also result in gastrointestinal problems such as nausea, constipation, or loose stools. Headaches and weakened immunity due to poor nutrition are common, as students often skip meals or rely on junk food during exams. Mentally, stress can manifest as constant worry, sadness, irritability, and a drop in motivation or interest in hobbies. In severe cases, it may trigger anxiety attacks or a cycle of negative self-talk that affects self-esteem and academic performance.

What role do sleep and diet play in managing exam anxiety?

Both sleep and diet are vital in controlling exam-related anxiety. Sleep helps the brain process and retain information, regulate emotions, and restore energy. It also lowers cortisol, the stress hormone, helping to keep anxiety in check. Students should aim for 7-9 hours of sleep, follow a consistent sleep schedule, and avoid screens before bedtime to ensure quality rest. Similarly, a balanced diet plays an equally important role. Foods rich in proteins, complex carbohydrates, healthy fats, vitamins, and minerals improve concentration, memory, and mood. Avoiding caffeine, sugar, and processed foods can prevent mood swings and help maintain energy levels throughout the day.

Does positive thinking and affirmation help in reducing exam stress?

Yes, positive thinking and affirmations are effective tools for reducing exam stress. The brain is capable of changing its thought patterns—a process known as neuroplasticity. When students repeatedly practice positive self-talk and affirmations, they start replac-

ing negative beliefs with encouraging thoughts. This shift boosts self-confidence and reduces anxiety. For example, repeating affirmations like "I am well-prepared" or "I can handle this exam" helps create a mindset of calm and confidence. Coupled with visualization techniques, such practices enhance focus, motivation, and mental readiness.

How can students overcome procrastination and manage their study time effectively?

Procrastination often stems from fear of failure or feeling overwhelmed. To overcome it, students should identify their distractions and set realistic study goals. Using time management strategies like the Pomodoro Technique—25 minutes of focused study followed by a 5-minute break—can improve concentration. Avoiding screens during breaks helps maintain momentum. Tackling difficult subjects first ("Eat the Frog" method) builds confidence early in the day. The Two-Minute Rule, which encourages completing tasks that take less than two minutes right away, helps reduce clutter and encourages a productive rhythm.

How can parents and teachers help students cope with exam stress?

Parents and teachers play a key role in supporting students. Parents can help by creating a calm, supportive environment at home, ensuring their child eats healthy, sleeps well, and has time for relaxation. Encouraging open conversations about exam fears and offering reassurance can greatly reduce stress. Teachers can assist by breaking down the syllabus, offering revision strategies, and showing empathy. Acknowledging students' efforts, not just outcomes, builds confidence. By working together, parents and teachers can help students build resilience and develop healthy coping strategies for academic challenges.

Purpose: To understand
what drives your work performance. Tip: Mention professional aspects like challenges,

Purpose: To understand your working style. *Tip:* Be honest, but try to demonstrate your flexibility and how you can adapt to both settings.
